Depth of Field

The ability of the camera lens to vary the amount of the scene that appears in focus, depth of field, is one of the most useful creative tools available to the photographer. Appropriate use of depth of field can often "make or break" a photograph. Say for example you were taking a head and shoulders portrait of a friend in their back yard, unfortunately, their yard leaves a lot to be desired, in terms of attractive backgrounds for the portrait. But with the depth of field control of your lens you can over come these difficulties, by choosing a shallow depth of field, the resulting picture should result in only your friend appearing in focus with the unattractive background no more than an indistinct blur. In other situations it may be desirable to have as much of the scene in focus as possible, such as photographing family members on holidays, so people who are looking at the photograph will be able to see clearly where you and your family were. So it is always important to consider the appropriate depth of field required before taking each photograph.

Whether you're a photographer or a painter, you realize as you grow older that there's nothing like the real thing. You're forced to admit there's a limit to what photography and painting can do. You look through your viewfinder at the Grand Canyon and you see a tiny piece of it from where you happen to be standing at the time. You know it's a miles deep and stretches from horizon to horizon, but you take the picture anyway.

When you get home and see that little 1" x 1 1/2" piece of film you're not overwhelmed. The grandeur of it as you stood at the rim, the length and the breadth of it -- the depth of it, and the utter majesty

of it. You don't see or feel that on the little piece of film, do you?

You're limited to two dimensions. You're a three dimensional human being who sees the depth of things and you're trying to fool yourself and everyone else with a little piece of the Grand Canyon in two dimensions. No matter how big you make your picture, no matter how big the painter paints his picture, it's not like standing on the North Rim and seeing the Colorado River ten miles away.

Maybe that's why eagles are not impressed with pictures, they've got the real thing under their wings.
