The idea is the birds can't see you, but they are attracted to the food. Ira is a bird photographer to begin with, so he had a great time. Sy was just fascinated with the entire process. On the drive home they were trying to devise a way of duplicating the set up with a minimum of expense. They went from a \$275.00 blind to a \$4.00 camouflage bed sheet from the Army Navy store. I want to be there when the two of them are running around in their sheets.

The three of them got some wonderful shots of the Chickadees and Blue Jays. The Cardinals wouldn't take the bait. I was thrilled to have the Chickadees eating from my hand. I have a number of shots of them doing this. I just held the camera in my right hand and shot them in my open left hand eating the seed.

I hope this spring, we can arrange another outing with ed. He is one of the nicest people I have met in a long time. He was very accommodating and really tries ro see we all had a good time.

Batteries Anyone

My digital camera eats batteries like a child eats candy! After only three or four exposures, I have to replace batteries. Naturally, I carry several spares with me at all times. However, I recently found a partial answer to my problem: I have, with my camera, a power adaptor, 3.75V, which I use when I'm hooked up to the computer for printing. (To conserve batteries) It suddenly dawned on me to add a 6-8 foot extension cord to the adaptor and use converted AC power to shoot! Of course, this would only be practical indoors, when I expect to many exposures, i.e. parties, dinners, etc., with a convenient outlet, saving the batteries for outdoors! So far, so good, with this innovation for me! My only other headache is the inability of my printer to give me bright RED colors (sweaters, etc.)instead of a pinkish-orange hue. I've tries all the adjustments, e.g. brightness, saturation, contrast, etc., to no avail. It may be the color cartridge, but I won't know until I change that! Other than those snags, I like my Olympus Camedia D-100 Digital camera, but wouldn't underestimate the value of a good, old Canon loaded with Kodak film.
