Your PFLI Delegate Al Herbst, reports that at the Jan. 27th meeting, the PFLI, resolved that the organization will conduct competitions in digitally projected images by this coming Fall season. This will of course have implications for clubs such as ours who will doubtlessly follow the lead of the parent organization. Digital projection eliminates the process of printing and mounting. It is not an exaggeration to state that now, the entire process of creating an image can be the pressing of a shutter button. The SCC Board has already decided to purchase a projector for educational presentations and for possible competitions in the future once the PFLI establishes guidelines and standards .

How do you feel about this development? Is it a good thing or bad? Will members stop printing and mounting photographs in favor of the less labor intensive and less expensive presentation of a jpeg file? Does the simplification of photography detract from the accomplishment of the image? I would like to publish your comments. Please send them to barryg@acmenet.net.

Editor's comments- It was not very long ago that the understanding of the term "Amateur Photographer" included the developing, printing and presentation of photographs. To produce a photograph, one had to understand the elements of exposure and the mechanics of the camera and related equipment. One had to mix chemicals, control temperatures and master the techniques of handling emulsions in total darkness. Even the process of drying the print was not straightforward. A well executed image was not uncommonly, the result of many hours of work in the darkroom. The modern digital camera has automated everything short of selecting the subject and it even has "modes" to help you take it. It seems that the working definition of Amateur Photographer needs some work. But then again, we are just a Camera Club.

Corky's nuggets- Regarding the John Owens editorial in your February 2006 edition, John is sharing some sports photography tips which were suggested by pro sports photographer Corky Trewin, Respectfully, I don't think three of the tips are technically correct. Specifically, in GO WIDE. He says to open the aperture all the way with a long lens. With the apparent shallow depth of field on a long lens, shouldn't we close down a bit? Next, he advises us to SLOW DOWN by using a slower shutter speed to compensate for opening up the aperture. Actually, the shutter speed should be increased if we want to open the aperture. Lastly, boosting the ISO allows for smaller apertures and faster shutter speeds, which is the opposite of what he is suggesting. It seems that either this editorial was either meant for the April Fools edition, or that Corky's nuggets need some polishing.

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Photo Mounting Tips

An essential part of displaying a photograph is properly mounting it. Using the right tools and techniques can save time and assure consistently good results. it is possible to make a guide that will allow you to place a given size photograph on a given size mat without measuring or drawing lines and always have accurate and level placement. Such a

guide can be made by cutting a piece of scrap mat board into a 'L' shape as shown. In use, the guide and mat are held in place by a spring clamp which holds them securely to the table. Just



apply your adhesive of choice to the back of the print print and place it on the mat flush against both edges of the guide.

The illustration shows a 8x12 print on a 16x20 mat. The guide is 4 inches on each side [(16-8)/2 = 4

and (20-12)/2 = 4

Speaking of adhesives, I have found that the 3M products, Photo Mount and ReMount to be clean working and convenient to use. ReMount has the advantage allowing the print to be removed at a later date but is not recommended for permanent bonding. Photo Mount is permanent. Either product allows the print to be lifted and repositioned after a few seconds in case you don't get it right the first time. Both are available at art supply stores.

The problem with any aerosol product is potential toxicity. I have gotten around that problem by using a

"spray booth" constructed from cardboard boxes (see illustration). The booth measures 16 in. wide x 18 in. high and 19 in deep. A small piece of wood under the front edge keeps it tipped back at an angle. In use, the print is placed in the booth leaning against the rear wall. The print is sprayed in a circular motion for about 2 seconds. My experience is that the amount of aerosol escaping from the booth is negligible. If that's not good enough for you, a "belt and suspenders" approach is to drape a clear plastic sheet over the opening of the booth and work with your hands behind the sheet (note the opening at the bottom for the hands). In either case, you should use a mask over your nose and mouth.

Scoring Standings as of February

High Average Awards are determined using the best 6 monthly scores of the season in each category and class. A member must enter at least 6 competitions to be eligible Ties will be broken with the 7th, 8th, and 9th monthly high score, as required. If a tie still exists, the scores for the member's second highest monthly entries will be used until the tie is broken. Smallest Camera with 10X Zoom

Panasonic has marketed a new camera, the DMC-TZ1. It is the smallest camera available to offer a 10X optical zoom. The camera has a 6-megapixel image sensor, although the highest quality image available to users is 5-megapixel because the camera doesn't use the entire sensor to capture images. Doing so would have increased the distance between the lens and sensor and made the camera larger.



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
