would include it here for those who have not read it before. We know Leica as the pioneer of the finest 35mm rangefinder camera. Behind its worldwide acceptance as a creative tool was a family-owned, socially oriented firm that, during the Nazi era, acted with uncommon grace, generosity and modesty.

Ernst Leitz II, who headed E. Leitz during the holocaust, acted in such a way as to earn the title, "the photography industry's Schindler." When Adolph Hitler rose to power, Leitz began receiving calls from Jewish associates, asking for his help in getting them and their families out of the country. As Christians, Leitz and his family were immune to Germany's Nuremberg laws, which restricted the movement of Jews and limited their activities. To help his Jewish workers and colleagues, Leitz established what has become known as "the Leica Freedom Train," a covert means of allowing Jews to leave Germany in the guise of Leitz employees being assigned overseas. Employees, retailers, family members, even friends of family members were "assigned" to Leitz offices in France, Britain, Hong Kong and the United States. Before long, German "employees" were disembarking from the ocean liner Bremen at New York where executives quickly found them jobs in the photographic industry. Each new arrival had around his or her neck the symbol of

freedom - a new Leica. The refugees were paid a stipend until they could find work.

Members of the Leitz family suffered for their good works. A top executive, Alfred Turk, was jailed and freed only after the payment of a large bribe. The Gestapo imprisoned Leitz's daughter when she was caught at the border, helping Jewish women cross into Switzerland. She eventually was freed but endured rough treatment. She also fell under suspicion when she attempted to improve the living conditions of 700 to 800 Ukrainian slave laborers.

The Leitz family apparently wanted no publicity for its efforts. Only after the last member of the family was dead did the "Leica Freedom Train" finally come to light.

If you do not have email or have lost the files and wish to enter the competition, please contact me (barry.goldstein@yahoo.com)

You may edit the image any way you wish within the resources provided by your image editing software, such as Photoshop, ACDSee, Paint Shop Pro, Photo Impact, etc., but you may not combine the images or add any element to the image from another source. You also may not use third party filters that were not part of the original software package. This gives you an incredible array of choices. So start working on it early and have fun.

After you have finalized your editing, make sure it is in sRGB mode, resize the image so that it is 750 pixels in the longest dimension (in Photoshop you do this under image>size) and then rename it according to the special naming format previously distributed. Once that is done just email them to Gerry as attachments.

## PFLI Program on Photoshop Layers, Levels & Curves

Photoshop is among other things an incredible complex powerful tool for producing photographs from digital files. Among the first things one must master to utilize the program effectively, is the use of layers and levels. Fortunately, help is on the way. Joanna Gazzola of the Nassau Camera Club will cover just those topics during a free program at the Plainview- Old Bethpage Library from 1:30 to 4:00 on Sunday, May 20, 2007. Judging by the response to other programs in this series. Try to be there about ½ early in order to get a good seat.

### **Exposure 101.1**

The automatic exposure systems in today's cameras are good. So good in fact, that many photographers rely entirely on the camera's calculation. If you're off by plus or minus a stop, you can adjust it on the computer if you're shooting RAW. For the purist however, that's not the same as getting the right exposure in the first place. John Brokos' explained how to adjust a spot metered exposure according to subject matter at his presentation on Feb. 25<sup>th</sup> at the Plainview Library. Nobody can argue with his results, in fact, at a very basic level, it employs the principles of the "Zone System. What John did not mention is the use of an incident light exposure meter. By measuring

the light that is falling on a subject, you in effect, cancel out all the variables of subject matter, whether they be the white feathers on a bird, snow scenes, black rocks, you name it. The incident light meter measures the available light and reads out the correct exposure for an 18% gray subject. In so doing, whites will be white, blacks will be black and everything in between will be correctly exposed relative to 18% gray. End of story. If you enjoy the technicalities of photography, why not pick up a used meter. Most incident meters can also be adjusted for reflected light.

### Am I Psychic Or What?

Some time ago in this rag, I stated with some degree of sarcasm, that since we have auto-focus, auto-exposure and anti-shake in or cameras, the only thing left for us to do is think about the picture and that will come to an end someday too. Well guess what? Fujifilm FinePix F31fd with "face detection" recognizes human faces, focuses on them in preference to other objects in the scene and adjusts exposure for the faces, even when they are backlighted. Another model, the 8.3 MP F40fd can automatically crop portraits of people and print them using direct to printer technology. Who knows? Maybe someday the camera will go to breakfast for us on Sunday so we can sleep longer.


