Not everyone needs Photoshop. If you are new to digital photography and would just like to do be able to download pictures from your camera and do the basic adjustments with minimal complications,

there are alternatives. After all, Photoshop CS3 runs about \$649 (\$199 to upgrade). The free Picassa program from the people, who brought you Google, remains a very attractive alternative to expensive software and is as good as most of the cheap stuff out there. Picassa even goes beyond the basics,

offering a pallet of useful effects including competent black and white conversion.

Do you like to shoot with existing light but are troubled by excessive noise? You can buy a new Canon EOS-1D Mark III for about \$8,000 or Download *Imagenomics Noiseware Community Edition*. It's free,

easy to use and pretty effective.

Tired of paying for an antivirus subscription? Are you tired of Norton taking control of your computer? There are many good antivirus programs that are non-intrusive and free such as Avast, AVG and others.





In view of the recent natural disasters, the unlikely perfect storm in which your computer and all your backups are mutually destroyed seems like a less remote possibility

than it used to be. Add to that, the risk of hard disc failure or a malevolent virus and there is reason for concern. Major corporations back up their files to a remote location. You can do the same thing by using a service such as MediaMax to store files online. It is the easy and secure. You get 25 GB free and more if you want to pay for it. 25 GB is not a lot when talking about images but it's more than ample for important personal files. With remote backup, you can access your files anywhere that you can get an Internet connection. Other sites are box.net, DropBoks, eSnips, MediaMax, OmniDrive and openomy.

**Canon RAW Codec**- the Canon RAW Codec is a plug-in that allows you to handle RAW Canon image files under Microsoft Windows Vista.



**Sticker Lite** is a free desktop sticky notes utility that offers you an easy way to keep information you have to remember on the desktop of your computer. It's like using a "sticky note" except its electronic and shows up only when you want it to.

Undelete It happens to everyone sooner or later. You delete a file, clean out the recycle bin and oops, that's the file you need. Undelete Plus among others is a free download and can restore your deleted file to the land of the living.

### Canon EOS 40D

The bottom line is that the Canon 40D is the most DSLR for the money that Canon has ever offered. Certainly in its price range there doesn't seem to be anything that can touch it. Move up a notch in price though and the forthcoming Nikon D300 may well put the squeeze on Canon's hegemony in the DSLR market-place. "The Canon 40D gives you the same 10-megapixel resolution as the Rebel XTi for nearly double the price, double the size, and double the weight. The sensor is the same physical size as on the Digital Rebel, resulting in a waste of glass when using lenses designed for the full-frame EOS bodies (film, 5D, and 1Ds). Why

would anyone want to buy the Canon 40D?". . . photonet

The EOS 40D is much more than a minor upgrade of the EOS 30D. It's basically a new camera with a new CMOS sensor, a new 14-bit processing engine, a new AF system and new features such as Live View, Highlight Priority and High ISO noise reduction as well as improved ergonomics with the enhanced 3" LCD. Though it looks much like the 20D/30D it has a more "professional" feel - though I'm not sure why. Perhaps it's the quieter and faster shutter operation that simply makes it sound better! ..... bobatkins.com

#### Nikon D300

"New CMOS sensor with twelve megapixels, a new auto-focus sensor with 51-points (15 of which are cross-type sensitive), focus tracking by color, scene recognition, Picture Control presets, six frames per second continuous shooting (or eight frames per second with a battery pack), Compact Flash UDMA support, Live View (with contrast detect AF) and a 3.0" 922,000 pixel LCD monitor and HDMI video output. The D200 was a fair step up from the D100, the D300 can be seen as just as big a step, certainly more than enough to make the competition sweat" ...dpreview

# How accurate is your exposure meter

Built into your D-SLR is an automatic exposure system that not only meters the exposure in multiple modes but also presents you



with a graphical representation of the exposure in the form of a histogram. You couldn't do that with your Weston Master could you? In fact automatic exposure systems are so good that only the most finicky professionals bother with an auxiliary exposure meterthat is if your exposing jpegs, RAW files are another

matter. Your camera's histogram is calibrated to show the resulting exposure after the cameras processor converts the digital data into a jpeg file, even if you are working in the RAW mode. The result is that your images may tend to be somewhat underexposed even though the histogram appears to be perfect. This is an area that the camera manufactures should work on, instead of giving us gimmicks that we never use.
