As a club we received more medals for a perfect 27 points than any other club in PFLI; five medals for 27 points. tions are in order to Robert Glick for his three 27's and to Marty Silverstein for his two 27's.

In the Annual All Stars Awards, the SCC was well represented in all categories entered. Allow me to boast and congratulate the winners.

17, 18, 19= Fair/OK image, an image that would have been good except for a significant flaw (ie exposure of by a little (19), a lot (18), focus, etc.)

- 20, 21,22= Good, nice image. Composition, lighting, subject are solid. No major errors, but no major plusses.
- 23, 24, 25= Very good/strong image. Technically correct. Everything is working together.
- 26, 27= Outstanding image. Will knock your socks off! No flaws. Exceptionally strong image.

Remember the old adage ... "If you received a 9, the judge was great, right on the money. If you got a 6 or 7, the judge was terrible and off his mark!"

Your board will bring this subject up at the next meeting to determine if we should go this route. It will require much discussion. ........ Al Herbst

## What your next camera will have

New features that eventually appear in SLRs can frequently be found in point and shoots. Therefore it is instructive to look at some of the innovations that are showing up in the new crop of point and shoot cameras. Face recognition is 'old hat' but the Fujifilm FinePix 100fd will recognize a face even when it's on the other side of a head, with 360-degree detection range. And now you can get smile recognition. By selecting the smile recognition mode on a Sony DSC-W170, DSC-W150 or Olympus FE series, the

camera will wait for a smile before making the exposure. High-speed capture is no longer the unique domain of the SLR. The Casio Exilim Pro EX-F1 can capture up to 60 frames per second at full 6 MP resolution either with or without flash. The Samsung NV24HD is the first camera to employ a organic light emitting diode (OLED) display. OLEDS use a fraction of the power of regular LEDs and can be viewed at very wide angles. Forget about blownout highlights, the nemesis of digital photography. New software algorithms are being used that allow manipulation of shadows and highlights never before achievable. This is done by basically exposing for the brightest area of the frame and then raising the ISO for the shadow area to achieve an ideal ratio of shadows

to highlights. WiFi wireless transfer is becoming commonplace, allowing transfer of images from your camera to a computer or the Internet by merely being in proximity to the hotspot. Want wide angle to super telephoto without changing lenses or attaching an auxiliary lens? No problem with the Nikon Coolpix P80 with a 27-486mm equivalent lens. A new motion detection feature in Canon Digital ELPH models automatically adjusts the ISO to allow the camera to use the appropriate shutter speed when it detects subject motion.

Those are just some of the new features showing up at the consumer level. Valuable or not, they represent advances in technology which will be built upon.

# **SLR Quality with Point and Shoot Convenience?**

The Sigma DP1 has the same Foveon X3 sensor that is used is the SD14 SLR. What you won't get is interchangeable lenses. You also won't get a viewfinder unless you opt for the \$139 accessory. The most interesting thing about this camera to me is that it has a 28mm equivalent lens. That means that you are limited to relatively wide-angle photography. This camera will appeal to those who like the format and for whom price is secondary to a quality product without the bulk of an SLR.
